BC WILDFIRE UPDATE: JULY 17, 2017

Updated as of 4:00 pm, Monday July 17, 2017

UPDATES:

- As of Monday, July 17, 2017, there are 162 wildfires burning across B.C. spanning greater than 131,000 hectares.
- Twenty First Nations communities are affected by the wildfires.
- The wildfires have already displaced around 40,000 people; another 27,000 people have been told they may need to leave their homes at a moment's notice.
- The city of Williams Lake has been ordered to evacuate; evacuees have been sent to Kamloops, BC (the Sandman Centre in Kamloops is serving as a wildfire evacuee reception centre)
- Apart from Prince George and Kamloops, additional evacuation centres are opening in Vernon, Kelowna, Chilliwack, Surrey, and Salmon Arm.
- The Thompson-Nicola Regional District has now posted an evacuation alert for areas around Little Fort and north to Clearwater, including the now all-important junction of Hwy. 24 and Hwy. 5, warning of imminent danger from fires and telling people to be ready to flee on a moment's notice.
- T'kemlups te Secwepemc (Kamloops) have opened their powwow grounds for evacuees. The grounds provide showers, RV space, and food. T'kemlups te Secwepemc may have space for livestock, as well as resources such as water and hay. For information call Ron @ 250-819-8012. Approximately 500-600 people are on site, and are receiving 3 meals a day. First Aid and mental health services are available. There is a need for greater Emergency Services Society support.

Bonaparte Indian Band

Bonaparte remains on an evacuation order. Several community members have remained to monitor and prevent the fire. An account has been set up to accept donations for Bonaparte Indian Band at Royal Bank.

Cooks Ferry Indian Band

Cooks Ferry is currently not under an evacuation order or evacuation alert. Cooks Ferry continue to monitor the wildfire situation.

The community remains on alert and is monitoring the fire patterns. The community continues to take precautionary measures. A Band Council Resolution for Alert is in place, and the community remains prepared.

Northeast Region (Prince George Fire Centre)

Alexis Creek First Nation

Alexis Creek remains under partial evacuation. The community has organized crews to enact preventative measures for their community, and has made requests for fire equipment. Some families from Anaham are staying in Alexis Creek. The ARDG provided the Northeast PREOC Aboriginal Liaison's contact information to follow up on the fire equipment.

Canim Lake Indian Band

Canim Lake remains under an evacuation order for 1 person at IR#4, and an Evacuation Alert for the rest of the community. The band office remains open at Canim Lake, as well as the Emergency Operations Centre. There is a need for greater resources. Canim Lake continues to monitor the

situation and is communicating regularly with EMBC. BCR for alert remains in place.

Stswecem'c Xgat'tem First Nation (Canoe Creek/Dog Creek)

Both communities are under an evacuation alert. The Canoe Creek side has no power or communications. A number of community members have evacuated to Kamloops due to health concerns. Satellite phones have been received and contact info will be updated as it becomes available.

HIGHWAY CLOSURES:

For the latest road closures and conditions, visit www.drivebc.ca.

- **Highway 1 from the Highway 97C junction near Ashcroft to about 5 kilometres east of Cache Creek**
- **Highway 97 from Cache Creek to Clinton**
- **Highway 99 from Highway 97 Junction to Hat Creek Road. Local Traffic only from Lillooet to Hat Creek Road**
- **Highway 97 from junction of Highway 24 to Timothy Lake Road (25 kilometres north of 100 Mile House), but open southbound for evacuees**
- **Highway 97 from Williams Lake to McLeese Lake**
- **Highway 5A between Princeton and Allison Lake**
- **Highway 97 southbound between Kersley (15 kilometres south of Quesnel) and McLeese Lake**
- **Highway 20 is open to eastbound traffic only. It's closed to westbound traffic (except emergency vehicles and first responders) at the Sheep Creek/Chilcotin Bridge, 25 kilometres west of Williams Lake to 5 kilometres west of Alexis Creek**
- **Highway 24 At Horse Lake Road (30 kilometres from 100 Mile House) to all traffic destined for 100 Mile House but open for traffic headed to Clinton.**
- **Highway 1 westbound from Savona to Cache Creek**
